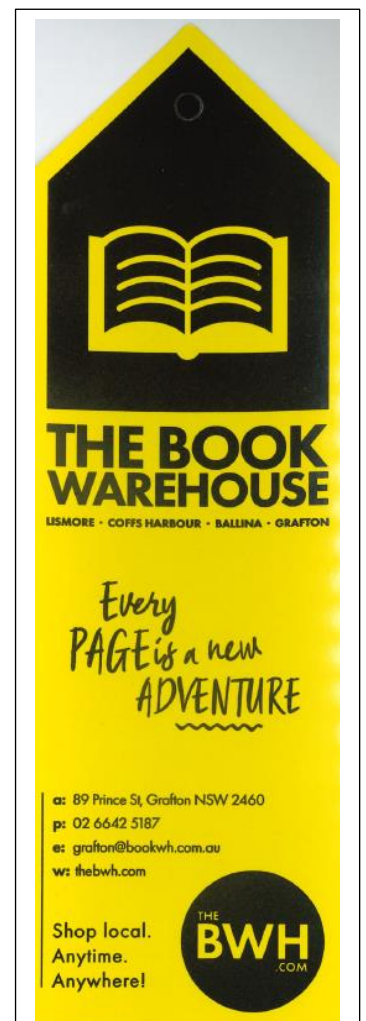

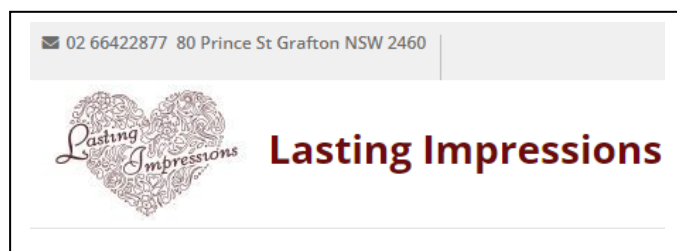

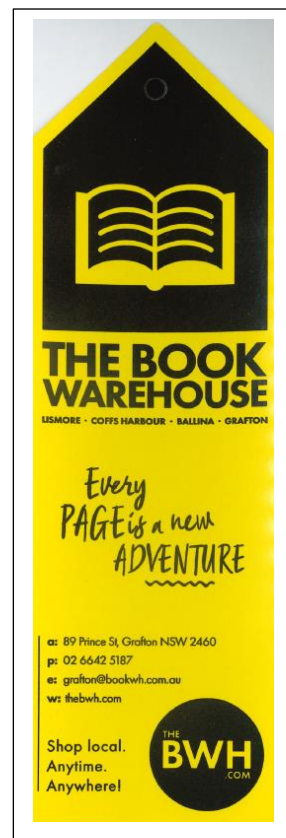

WOOL ARTICLE/GARMENT STATE COMPETITION



Competition to be Conducted at Society, Group & State Level

CLASS: THREE DIFFERENT TYPES OF WOOL ARTICLES AND/OR GARMENTS

CONDITIONS:

1. For the purpose of this competition the following definitions apply:
 - a) Garment: an item that can be worn e.g. dress, jacket, scarf, hat
 - b) Article: a utility item that is not worn but can be used in the home e.g. blanket; with an outfit eg. bag; for amusement eg. toy; as a decoration eg. picture etc.
 - c) Three Different Types: the 3 items in an entry must differ from each other in terms of their construction technique and/or their purpose eg.1 a knitted jumper, blanket and tea cosy OR eg.2 a knitted tea cosy, a crocheted tea cosy or a felted tea cosy OR eg.3 a knitted jumper, a knitted blanket and a crocheted blanket.
2. The whole article and/or garment must be constructed of, and contain a minimum of, 80% SHEEP wool.
3. Exhibits (articles/garments) may be knitted, crocheted, sewn, felted etc and must be hand crafted (use of machine is permitted).
4. A sample of the yarn, fabric or fibre with label must be attached to each item making up the exhibit. If a label is not available such as in the case of a hand spun or felted item, a handwritten label with relevant details and sample will suffice."
5. An exhibit in this competition may consist of the work of one individual or a group of individuals, or an organization.
6. All three article/garments must have been completed within the 12 months prior to the local show and made by the exhibitor/s.
7. An exhibit having won at a local show may be exhibited (the same three article/garments) at the Group Final. The winning exhibit at the Group Final is then eligible to compete in the State Final.
8. An exhibit is only eligible to represent one Society at Group level and one Group at State level.
9. An exhibit (article/garment) that has previously competed at Group level is not eligible to compete again.
10. If this class is not scheduled or attracts no entries at a local show, the Chief Pavilion Steward in consultation with the appropriate Pavilion Section Judges, may select three suitable individual exhibits and, with the exhibitor's permission, enter them in the Group judging as an exhibit representing the particular Society concerned.
11. It is the responsibility of the Group Secretary and winner to co-ordinate the transfer of the winning entry to the ASC Office in Sydney for the State judging.
- 12.** Recommendation: State Final garments are to include a photo of the garment being worn (where possible and applicable).

Rules as at 15th June 2022

TINY SQUARE SHETLAND SHAWL

Yarn 2/30 wool, or other lace yarn.

Needles 5 x 2mm double ended, or size to suit yarn.

Crochet hook and small amount of waste yarn.

4 pattern markers.

Knitted in garter st, with no actual right side.

Finished size – varies according to yarn and needles.

Abbreviations:

CO - cast on

Yo - yarn over needle to make eyelet

PU - pick up

CENTRE SQUARE - Rosebud

Crochet 35 ch, from which to CO 28 sts. This is Row 1 of the centre square.

Row 2: k13, k2tog, k13. 27 sts.

Row 3: k27.

Row 4: k2, k2tog, yo, k1, yo, k2tog, k13, k2tog, yo, k1, yo, k2tog, k2.

Row 5: k27.

Row 6: k1, k2tog, yo, k3, yo, k2tog, k11, k2tog, yo, k3, yo, k2tog, k1.

Row 7: k27.

Row 8: k2, yo, k2tog, yo, k3tog, yo, k13, yo, k2tog, yo, k3tog, yo, k2.

Row 9: k27.

Row 10: k3, yo, k3tog, yo, k15, yo, k3tog, yo, k3.

Row 11, 12, 13, 14: k27.

Row 15: k11, k2tog, yo, k1, yo, k2tog, k11.

Row 16: k27.

Row 17: k10, k2tog, yo, k3, yo, k2tog, k10.

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Row 18: k27.

Row 19: k11, yo, k3tog, yo, k2tog, yo, k11.

Row 20: k27.

Row 21: k12, yo, k3tog, yo, k12.

Row 22, 23, 24, 25: k27.

Repeat rows 4 – 25.

Repeat rows 4 – 10.

Knit 2 rows.

There is a total of 58 rows, including the CO row.

PICK UP AROUND CENTRE SQUARE

Turn work, and k to end of row. “Right Side”/front of work will be facing – mark this with a coloured thread to avoid confusion. Leave these 27 sts on one needle.

Use a new needle for each side.

PU and k27 sts down LH side.

Recover co sts – 27, and k across them.

PU and k 27 sts up RH side.

BREAK ROW, AND SETUP FOR BORDERS

From now on, the rows are alternately knitted and purled, to maintain the garter st. The odd rows are knitted, and the even rows are purled.

The following instructions are for one side only, and, therefore, are knitted 4 times per round.

BORDERS – Spiders and Ferns

Row 1 (knit): k1(centre st of mitre), place Start marker,(yo, k2tog) 13 times, yo. 28 sts, including the last yo, on each needle. On needles 2, 3, and 4, place ordinary markers after each mitre centre st, ie. the first st on each needle. Complete to match Needle 1.

Row 2 (purl): P28, slipping the marker after the first st.

Row 3: k1, sl marker, yo, k27,yo. 30 sts.

Row 4: P30

Row 5: k1, yo, k4, yo, k2tog, k6, k2tog, yo, k1, yo, k2tog, k7, yo, k2tog, k3, yo.

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Row 6: p13, p2tog, yo, p3, yo, p2tog, p12.

Row 7: k1, yo,k3, k2tog, yo,k1, yo, k2tog, k5, yo, k3tog, yo, k2tog, yo, k5, k2tog, yo, k1, yo, k2tog, k3, yo.

Row 8: p15, yo, p2tog, p1, p2tog, yo, p14.

Row 9: k1, yo, k3, k2tog,yo, k3, yo, k2tog, k5, yo, k3tog, yo, k5, k2tog, yo, k3, yo, k2tog, k3, yo.

Row 10: p36.

Row 11: k1, yo, k3, k2tog, yo, k1, yo, k3tog, yo, k1, yo, k2tog, k11, k2tog, yo, k1, yo, k3tog, yo, k1, yo, k2tog, k3, yo.

Row 12: p38.

Row 13: k1, yo, k3, k2tog, yo, k1, yo, k2tog, k1, k2tog, yo, k1, yo, k2tog, k9, k2tog, yo, k1, yo, k2tog, k1, k2tog, yo, k1, yo, k2tog, k3, yo.

Row 14: p40.

Row 15: k1, yo, k4, yo, k2tog, yo, k2tog, k3, k2tog, yo, k2tog, yo, k4, yo, k2tog, k3, yo, k2tog, yo, k2tog, k3, k2tog, yo, k2tog, yo, k4, yo.

Row 16: p7, yo, p2tog, yo, p2tog, k1, p2tog, yo, p2tog, yo, p11, yo, p2tog, yo, p2tog, p1, p2tog, yo, p2tog, yo, p6.

Row 17: k1, yo, k7,yo, k2tog, yo, k3tog, yo, k2tog, yo, k4, k2tog, yo, k1, yo, k2tog, k4, yo, k2tog, yo, k3tog, yo, k2tog, yo, k7, yo.

Row 18: p10, yo, p2tog, p1, p2tog, yo, p15, yo, p2tog, p1, p2tog, yo, k9.

Row 19: k1, yo, k10,yo, k3tog, yo, k17, yo, k3tog, yo, k10, yo.

Row 20: p46.

Row 21: k1, yo, k45, yo.

Row 22: p48.

Row 23: k1, yo, k1, (k2tog, yo, k1, yo, k2tog, k15) twice, k2tog, yo, k1, yo, k2tog, k1, yo.

Row 24: p2, (p2tog, yo, p3, yo, p2tog, p6, yo, p2tog, p5) twice, p2tog, yo, p3, yo, p2tog, p1.

Row 25: k1, yo, k2, (yo, k3tog, yo, k2tog, yo,k15) twice, yo, k3tog, yo, k2tog, yo, k2, yo.

Row 26: p4, (yo, p2tog, p1, p2tog, yo, p5, p2tog, yo, p1, yo, p2tog, p5) twice, yo, p2tog, p1, p2tog, yo, p3.

Row 27: k1, yo, k4, (yo, k3tog, yo, k17) twice, yo, k3tog, yo, k4, yo.

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Row 28: p54.

Row 29: k1, yo, k53, yo.

Row 30: p56.

Leave these 4 x 56 sts on the needles. Do not cast off, and don't break the yarn.

KNIT THE EDGING ONTO THE BORDERS

The edging is knitted in garter st, in short rows.

With "right" side facing, and spare needle, K the first st (centre st of mitre) on needle 1, then sl it, knitted, back onto needle 1.

Crochet 15ch and secure end.

Turn knitting so that wrong side faces, with needle 1, and yarn, in the right hand. From the crocheted ch, loosely knit up 8 sts, using the attached yarn and needle 1. The last st picked up will be the outside edge

of the edging. The edging is knitted on in an anticlockwise direction around the shawl, with the right side facing.

Carefully turn the work, to begin the first pattern row of the edging, from the outside edge. Use a spare needle.

Row 1: k2, yo, k2tog, yo, k2, k2 edging sts together with the first border st (that was previously knitted) on the left hand needle. ie. k3tog. Turn work.

Row 2: sl the joining st (the last one knitted) purlwise onto the RH needle. Put the yarn around the needle ready to k the edging thus, k3, yo, k2tog, yo, k2. Turn.

Row 3: (towards border) sl 1 purlwise, yarn to back of work, k1, yo, k2tog, yo, k4, k2tog (1 edging st, and the second border st). Turn.

Row 4: sl 1 purlwise, k5, yo, k2tog, yo, k2. Turn

Row 5: sl 1 purlwise, k1, yo, k2tog, yo, k6, k2tog (3rd border st). Turn

Row 6: sl 1 purlwise, k7, yo, k2tog, yo, k2. Turn.

Row 7: sl 1 purlwise, k1, yo, k2tog, yo, k8, k2tog. Turn

Row 8: sl 1 purlwise, k9, yo, k2tog, yo, k2. Turn.

Row 9: sl 1 purlwise, k2tog, yo, k2tog, yo, k2tog, k7, k2tog. Turn.

Row 10: sl 1 purlwise, k6, k2tog, yo, k2tog, yo, k2tog, k1. Turn.

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Row 11: sl 1 purlwise, k2tog, yo, k2tog, yo, k2tog, k5, k2tog. Turn.

Row 12: sl 1 purlwise, k4, k2tog, yo, k2tog, yo, k2tog, k1. Turn.

Row 13: sl 1 purlwise, k2tog, yo, k2tog, yo, k2tog, k3, k2tog. Turn.

Row 14: sl 1 purlwise, k2, k2tog, yo, k2tog, yo, k2tog, k1. Turn.

Row 15: sl 1 purlwise, k2tog, yo, k2tog, yo, k2tog, k1, k2tog. Turn

Row 16: sl1 purlwise, k2tog, yo, k2tog, yo, k2tog, k1. Turn.

Repeat these 16 rows, 7 times on each side of the shawl. Graft the two ends together, put in the two ends, and dress firmly. Trim ends.
